What are SATs?

- Tests set by the government.
- Taken in Years 2 and 6 - the end of Key stages.

Why do the children do SATs?

- Forms part of the assessment of where the children are at the end of Key Stage 1 in terms of maths, reading and writing.

Maths

Children will sit two tests: Paper 1 and Paper 2:

- Paper 1 is for arithmetic, lasting approximately 25 minutes and worth 25 marks. It covers calculation methods for all operations.
- Paper 2 covers problem solving, reasoning and mathematical fluency, lasts for approximately 35 minutes and is worth 35 marks. This paper includes some (5) mental maths questions.

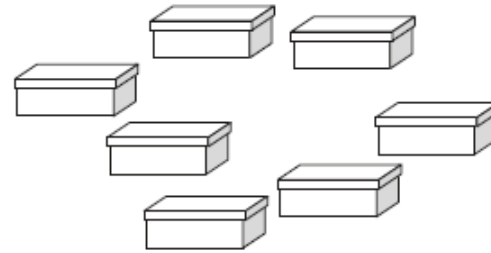

Reading

The Reading Test consists of two separate papers:

- Paper 1 - Contains a selection of texts with questions about the text and lasts about 30 minutes.
- Paper 2 - Contains a reading booklet of a selection of passages and lasts about 40 minutes. Children will write their answers to questions about the passage in a separate booklet.
- Each paper is worth half of the papers.
- The texts will cover a range of poetry, fiction and non-fiction.
- Questions are designed to assess the comprehension and understanding of a child's reading.
- Some questions are multiple choice or selected response, others require short answers and some require an extended response or explanation.
